### **Technology Services Report**

May 7, 2012

### **Technology Vision:**

The Highland Central School District is a learning community that is student-centered, focusing on the development of independent, lifelong learners. The HCSD provides a quality education that promotes positive and healthy student growth. The District works in a collaborative manner with both the community and its partners.

Highland Central School District Administrators believe that the use of technology is essential to instruction and learning. Providing teachers and students with state of the art technology tools within their classroom setting is integral to an enriched and engaging learning experience.

### **NEWS:**

### Infrastructure

The BOCES Board approved our IPA on April  $18^{th}$  at their meeting. Allison Dodd forwarded the proposal to the SED and believes she should hear back in a few weeks. She then will work with KeyBank and this financing normally takes a few weeks. We are working towards a scheduled start date in the range of 6/26 - 6/28, pending the completion of a PO by BOCES to Annese.

### <u>Virtual Desktop Initiative / Windows 7</u>

The most cost effective way to upgrade computers and workstations is to look at virtualizing the desktop. We first need to examine the workstation itself to determine if it can handle a full installation of Windows 7, and if it can't, then how best to get that machine replaced. We will replace it by:

- running a virtual desktop which means using the existing hardware and pushing a
   Windows 7 image to it
- purchasing a 'thin client' which will not be a full blown computer but will receive a
   Windows 7 image. Thin clients are much cheaper to purchase and less labor intensive to deploy than an actual computer.
- Purchasing a brand new computer, depending on what the demands are for the machine.

The other costs involved with running a virtual environment are servers and software. You need to have a server capable of pushing that image out to several hundred desktops, across the whole network at the same time. Now that we will have an infrastructure capable, we can and use a server that we can build on as we go – these servers typically need a lot of RAM, large hard drive spaces, etc.

### **iPads**

We brought iPads into our district more than one year ago, for student use. To reach its greatest potential for increasing student achievement and engagement, a tablet device should be used as a personal learning tool, ideally.

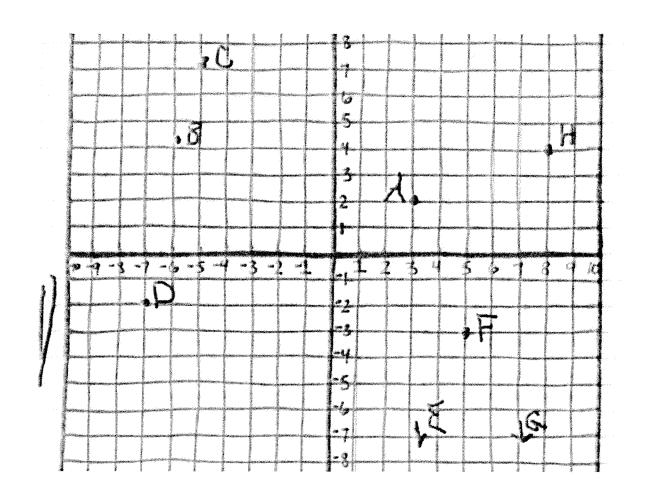
I have been working with an employee who supports a student with special needs figure out how to best use an iPad in the classroom. We have been working together for a few weeks to see what apps would be needed in order for this student to be more engaged and involved in their own learning. Using an iPad configured specifically to this student's needs, the student was able to plot on a graph for the very first time, alone. The student has learned to take a picture of the problem, enlarge it on the iPad, use a stylus to plot the points, and then use handwriting to label the points. I have attached this chart for your observation. The student requires support for learning the apps and when to use the proper app, but the student can do the most important piece by themself.

This was an exciting achievement for the support person and me, not to mention how the student must have felt. I think this is a perfect example of ever-increasing technology capabilities and proper levels of support working together for a child's success.

### Wireless

We continue to install wireless access points in the High School within our new system. We can only continue to install them in certain parts of the building for now until we get new switches. We installed a different sort of system in the Elementary School, with 4 access points around the iPad cart, and will put more in all buildings this summer.

### BOARD OF EDUCATION May 7, 2013 OPERATIONS AND MAINTENANCE REPORT

### **GENERAL**

- Buildings remain in good shape.
- Grounds are shaping up quickly.

### **GROUNDS**

- The weather, for the most part, has cooperated with the sports schedule this year and most events have been on schedule. This helps greatly with scheduling and completing field preparation.
- Because of the differences between the field layout for boys and girls lacrosse, the middle school field became the boy's field and the high school football field became the girl's field. This includes games played for Southern Ulster LAX. The girls do less damage to the field, hence their location on the football field instead of the boys.
- There is considerable concern we are overplaying the middle school field. Lacrosse is intense and a very large number of players, practices and games are taking place there for all year around sports so much now, that it may be fruitless to complete our annual inter-seeding we usually do to keep that field green. This difficulty is compounded by the lack of rain and no practical way to water the field.
- Custodians have recently been instructed to mow designated areas, such as parking lot islands and other areas close to all the school buildings to reduce substitute costs incurred by scheduling a custodian as a third grounds man during sports seasons. This work is to be scheduled and completed with minimal effect on the building's operations during the day.

### **FACILITIES**

- The maintenance men are continuing to installing a few remaining smart boards in the middle school and the elementary school.
- The maintenance men and the middle school custodians have cleared out the "coal bin" storage room at the middle school to begin construction of the new records room with the funds received for materials through a grant specifically for this project.

### **EQUIPMENT**

A small enclosed trailer was added to the grounds men's equipment to improve productivity and allow one man to mow at one school while another is painting sports field lines at another. The mowing and painting equipment will remain on the trailers in off hours allowing for quicker deployment the next day.

### SCHOOL BUS MAINTENANCE

- Six (6) buses were inspected on April 25, 2013. All six (6) passed. This generates a 100% passing rate for the current inspection cycle.
- Some unusual repair expenses have been encountered with ABS brake system computers, airbag issues and radiator problems.
- The bus mechanics pulled a transmission on site to rebuild and replace the gaskets to stem a fluid leak. They should be commended for taking on this task.
- We are constantly pushing for warranty compensation through parts and trade offs for labor on non-warranty repairs we can't do, generated by our people installing warranty parts instead of taking the bus off line and out of the district for the work. Considerable savings has been generated through the efforts of the bus garage.

### A) Meal Counts

- 1) Breakfast average meal count is now 259 per day. The highest breakfast count was 282. These figures only include reimbursable meals, not a la carte sales. Participation was 14%.
- 2) Lunch average meal count is now 934 per day. The highest lunch meal count was 1016 per day. Participation was 52%.
- Due to our spring break being the last week in March, we only had 15 serving days.
- Our free and reduced percentage remains at 33%.

### B) Highlights

On March 15<sup>th</sup> I attended the Hudson Valley Food Service Directors meeting held at the Culinary Institute of America. This is an opportunity for the area directors to discuss what is happening in their schools. The main topic of conversation was concerning the new breakfast regulations that will take effect in the 2013 – 2014 school year. Spoke briefly about the upcoming regulations for the competitive foods regulations for 2014 – 2015.

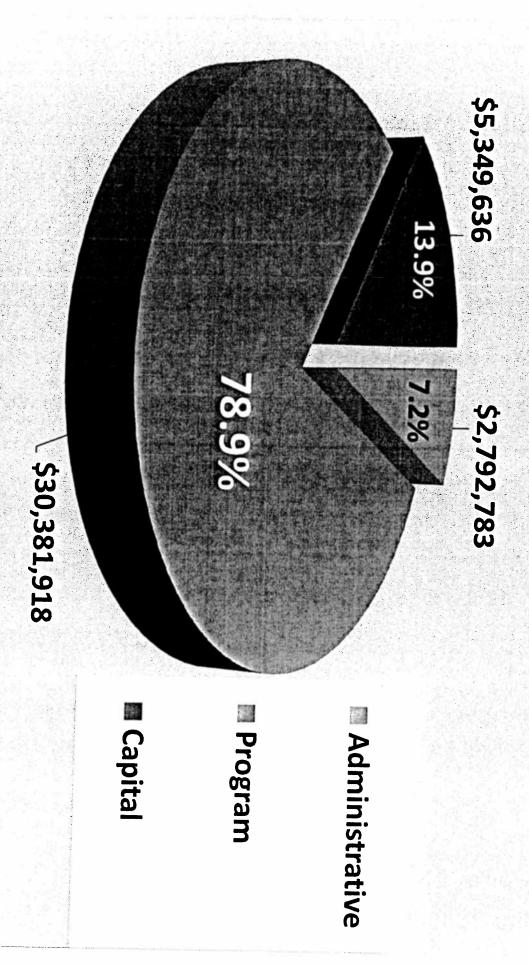

### Transportation Safety and Security Proposition 2



The existing fleet has unreliable, antiquated cameras some of which still operate using VHS & BETA tape systems. The proposition will support upgrading the entire fleet with modern technology that will allow webbased monitoring and recording capacity, including real-time viewing.

The new cameras are intended to deter student discipline issues and help in investigations into behavioral referrals.

The busses will also all be equipped with one external camera to monitor activity outside of the busses.

The maximum cost of the new system will be \$200,000 with the purchase being offset with 56.5% state aid

### SUBJECT: SELECTION/CLASSIFICATION CRITERIA AND PROCEDURES

The New York State Education Department and the New York State Public High School Athletic Association endorse a selection/classification system whereby middle school students can qualify for high school athletic programs after a screening process to determine their readiness (physical maturity, fitness and skill) to compete in interscholastic athletic competition. The intent of the Highland Central School District athletic program, when all criteria are met, is to provide students in grades 8-12 an opportunity to participate at an appropriate level of competition based on readiness rather than based solely on age and grade. In the Highland Central School District the selection/classification screening process shall be used sparingly and only for those students who display an exceptional aptitude and skill for a particular sport.

- 1. **Eighth graders only** (with certain criteria listed below) may qualify, using the selection/ classification process to try out for **junior varsity** programs where a modified, junior varsity and varsity level program exists in the district for the sport of interest
- 2. **Eighth graders** (with certain criteria listed below) may qualify, using the selective/ classification process for **varsity level** programs where no modified or junior varsity programs exist in the district as long as it is a non-contact sport (e.g. swimming, cross country, bowling, tennis, and golf)

### Criteria

- Students must meet all of the state mandated criteria for readiness including physical maturity, fitness, and skill.
- Students must also meet additional academic and behavioral/emotional maturity criteria to be considered for the selection/classification process:
  - > Students must have a "B" average or above (80 or higher) in their core academic courses
  - > Students must submit a behavioral/emotional maturity recommendation form from a current building administrator, guidance counselor, or teacher who is not the coach of the sport that child is interested in trying out for.
- If an 8<sup>th</sup> grade student has qualified for a try out and made a junior varsity level team, they may not be elevated to the varsity level sport during their 8<sup>th</sup> grade school year.
- If a student in 8<sup>th</sup> grade has reached the chronological age of 15 years old prior to September 1, they are eligible to participate on high school athletic teams without being processed through the selection/classification screening procedure.

### SUBJECT: SELECTION/CLASSIFICATION CRITERIA AND PROCEDURES (Cont'd)

- Selection/classification screening is not to be used to: fill positions on a team when
  interest in the sport is lacking; reward a student; provide additional experience; or provide
  a place for middle school students when no modified program exists.
- Participation on any athletic team is a privilege, not a right. If a student who has been selectively classified to participate at an advance level does not continually meet the behavioral and academic criteria set forth in this document, they may be removed from the high school level team.
- 3. Highland CSD will not be utilizing the following items from the New York State Selection Classification Program for interschool Athlete Program Guide dated March 2005:
  - a. Special Approval Request Application
  - b. Special Case Physician Forms for both Boys and Girls
- 4. Highland CSD has modified Attachment F (Athletic Performance Testing Instructions for the Tester) as shown in the New York State Selection Classification Program for Interschool Athlete Program Guide dated March 2005 to limit the number of times items can be retested.
